goes in a few days to Berlin she

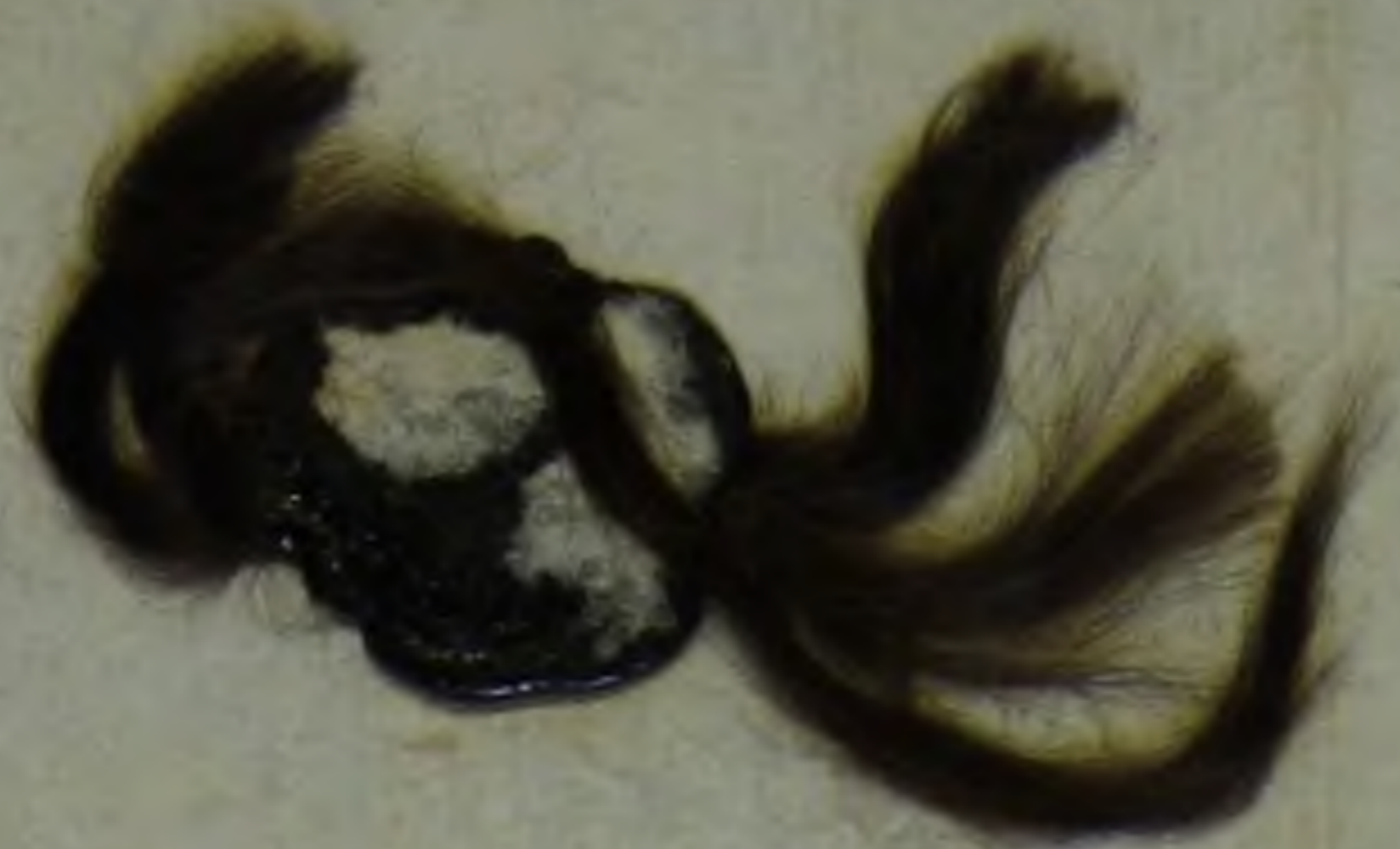


makes the more hast in hope change
