 desire and a pledge of a future endea-

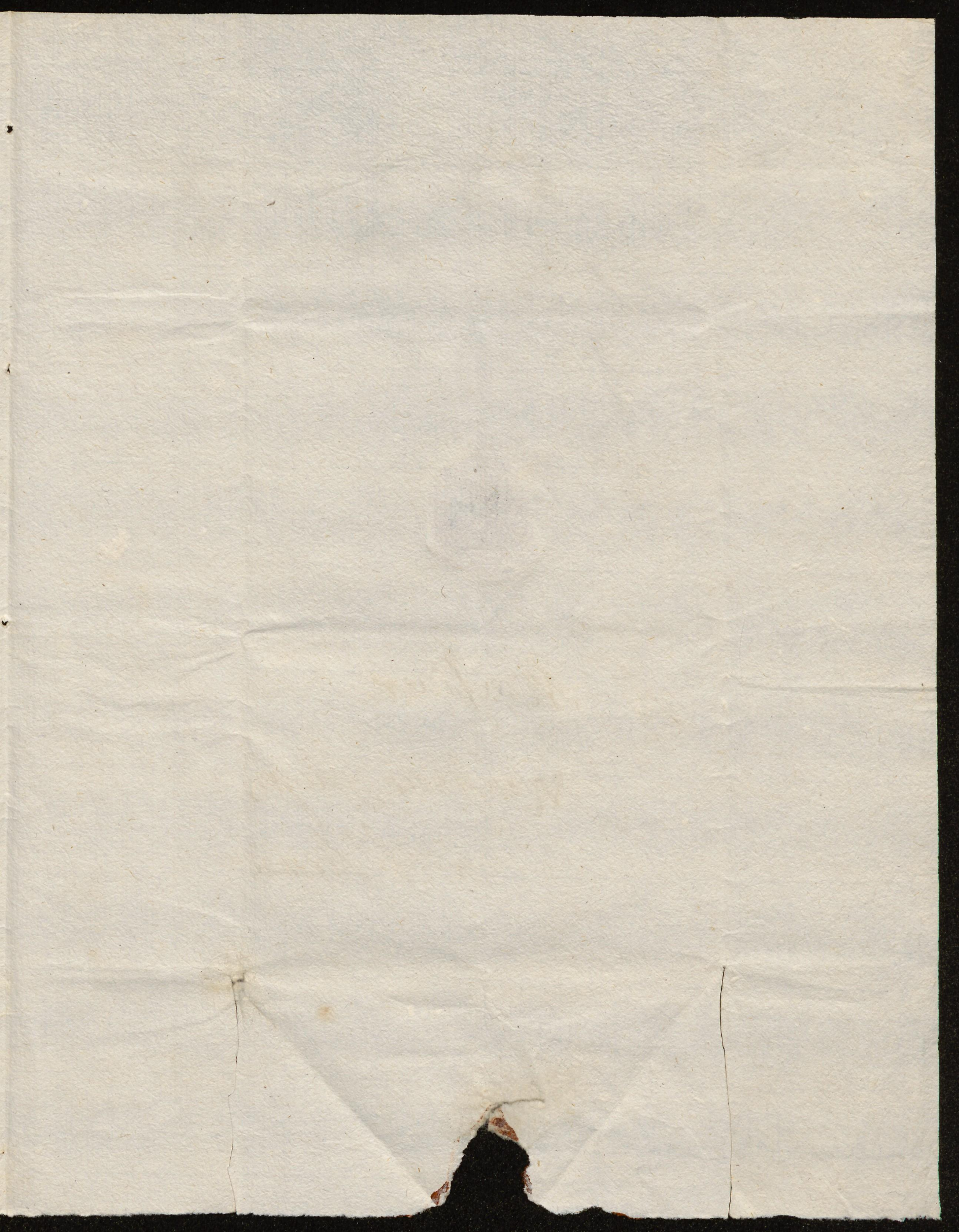
