I am something confident it will not be long ere I  
have a supply from my Mother, out of which I shall not  
faile to make repayment to you, not out of doubt but  
that you have bin answerable for this sume, which I  
have made use of. Sir I beseech you make a favourable  
conjecture, and beleue I did not at first embrace what  
now I have accepted, to ridd of some small debts,  
which oft prove more hurtfull then greater, if  
they shoud not in time bee taken of, for it was  
far from me to esteome your letter (which you sent  
me) a compliment, upon which I have presumed you  
will pardon,
