I conceive upon the whole matter that I can make no satisfactory  
dispat<sup>3</sup> unto Her Ma<sup>tie</sup> unless you please to give me some answere  
in writing to the paper I gave you yesterday, w<sup>ch</sup> I do beseech  
you very earnestly to do, or at least to give me a promise that  
at your conuenience I shall receive it. And however if you  
remember the answer to the 6<sup>th</sup> article was absolutely mis-  
taken, upon an opinion that it had reference to the States shipp  
w<sup>ch</sup> were not thought upon, as since you understand; & the matter it  
imports is not difficult, but may well give roome for a good answer.  
I am very unwilling to returne that paper you gave me, just as  
it is, and the ground of that unwillingnes is an ambition, wherein  
your selfe & I am emulous, w<sup>ch</sup> is, to serve both their Maties &  
His highnes in this treaty in such a manner that both may receive  
perfect satisfaction by it; as I will hope that in conclusion  
they shall do. If you please to let the bearer bring ~~one~~ word  
when you will be at leasure this night and I shall not faile to  
attend you, being
